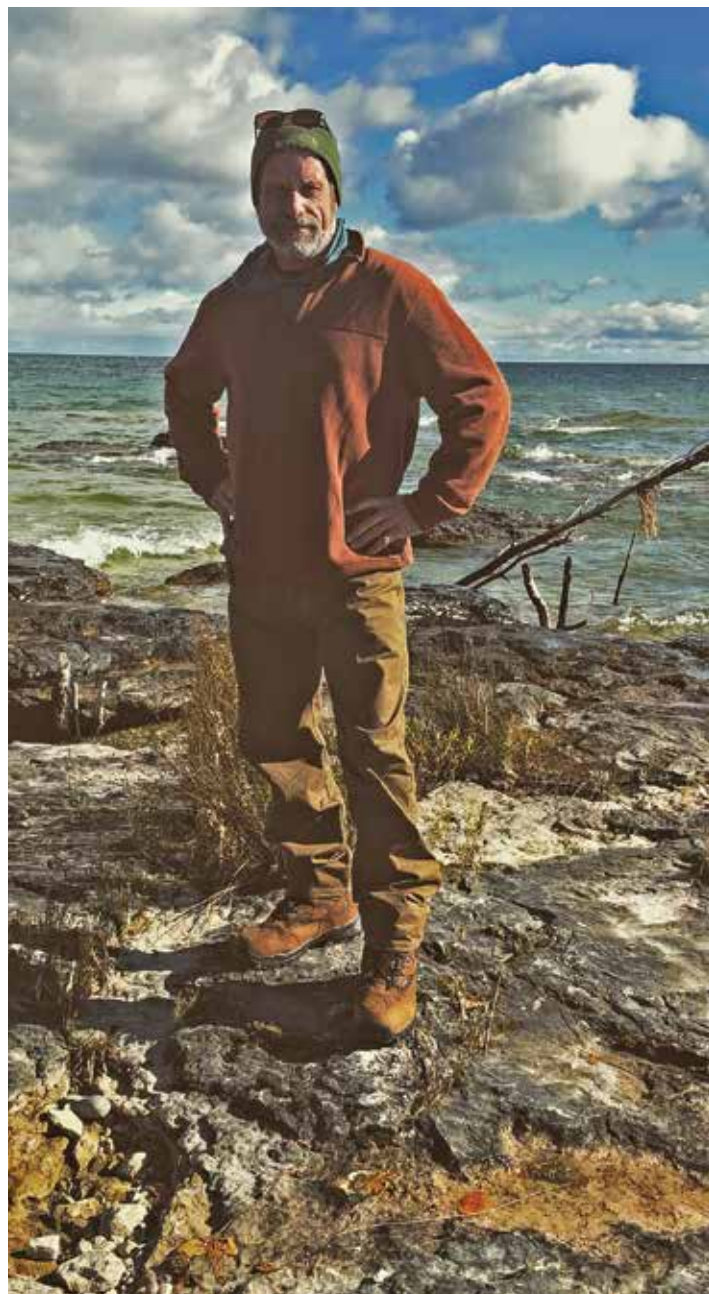

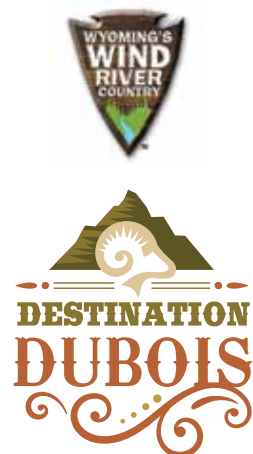

May 28 – June 3 Katie Jo Suddaby Art for Letting Go:

Tibetan Sand Mandalas and the Practice of Impermanence
Sand mandalas are delicate, colorful works of art that take days to complete, then are brushed away, to help people accept that nothing is permanent. Katie Jo's sessions at the Ranch will focus on impermanence and the internal process of adapting better to unexpected changes. The sessions will also draw on her knowledge of the spiritual and temporary art of many world religions and explore how modern Americans can faithfully and respectfully access ancient traditions for their own devotional practices. Sand art lessons will be available for all ages and no prior experience is necessary. **Katie Jo Suddaby**, an ordained American Baptist pastor, is one of the world's only sand mandala artists trained by Tibetan Buddhist monks in the U.S. and Nepal. She has studied the techniques and philosophies of sand arts from Tibet, China, Japan, India, and several Native American tribes. For Katie Jo, sand painting has become a way of being. Her art has been displayed at the World Parliament of Religions, on various American television channels, and at festivals throughout the United States.



June 11 – 17 Joy Carroll Wallis & Jim Wallis The Changing Faces of Vocation and Calling

Sharing their own stories and listening to yours, Joy and Jim will explore what it means for this and the next generation to discover their vocation, how that makes a difference in the world, and how that presents the challenge to herald a new kind of church. Whether you are fan of the 'Vicar of Dibley', want to make a difference in the world or both, this session will have something to lift your spirits! In 1994, **Joy Carroll Wallis** was one of the first women to be ordained in the Church of England. Her ministry in the inner-city embraced the needs of the poor, homeless, mentally ill, families, youth and the elderly. Her experience in the priesthood was the inspiration behind the hit BBC sitcom, "The Vicar of Dibley." **Jim Wallis** is the inaugural holder of the Endowed Chair in Faith and Justice and the founding Director of the Georgetown University Center on Faith and Justice. He is the founder of Sojourners magazine, a New York Times bestselling author, widely recognized public theologian, renowned speaker, and regular international commentator on ethics and public life.



June 25 – July 1 Julian Michael DeShazier & Robert Franklin Moral Leadership and Reimagining the Next Normal

Drawing on Robert Franklin's book, *Moral Leadership: Integrity, Courage, Imagination*, this session will explore how people come to be moral leaders. We will use insights from developmental psychology to analyze how virtue and leadership skills may be nurtured and how moral leaders think about love, power and justice and how they frame public issues as moral issues. We will diagnose current social crises and develop strategies for how we can contribute to the repair and reimagining of local communities and the nation. **Julian "J.Kwest" DeShazier** is the Senior Pastor of University Church Chicago and an Emmy Award-winning musician. Named by the Center for American Progress as one of "10 Faith Leaders to Watch" in 2018, he also serves as Associate Director of the Office of Experiential Education at McCormick Theological Seminary. Julian's father, **Robert Franklin**, currently holds the James T. and Berta R. Laney Chair in Moral Leadership at Candler School of Theology. He previously served as president of Morehouse College and, before that, president of the Interdenominational Theological Center in Atlanta. In 2016, Franklin was named to the HRC's council on expanding LGBTQ equality and inclusion efforts at Historically Black Colleges and Universities.

July 9 – 15 **Melanie DeMore** **Tightening the Weave of Community:** *Pounding for Peace!*

Learn the basics of Gullah sticking pounding. We will create a foot-stomping, hand-clapping rhythmic community and combine it with singing spirituals and songs of protest and peace. Participants will learn about Gullah/Geechee culture through its dynamic music and rhythmic heart. We will, as a community, turn the whole place into a living, breathing drum. Each participant will receive a pounding stick at the workshop that you can personalize throughout our time together. If you have items you would like to use, bring them along (ribbons, cloth, shells, beads, stones – whatever represents you and your story). **Melanie DeMore** is a Grammy-nominated singer/composer, choral conductor, music director, and vocal activist who believes in the power of voices raised together. She facilitates vocal and stick pounding workshops for professional choirs and community groups as well as directing numerous choral organizations in the Bay Area. She is a featured presenter of SpeakOut! - The Institute for Social and Cultural Change and was a founding member of the Grammy-nominated ensemble Linda Tillery and the Cultural Heritage Choir.



July 16 – 22 **Mark Freeland** **Making Relatives:** *Kinship as an Ethical System of Thought*

In a colonial and transient world, how does one find a sense of belonging in place? This week will explore the relational possibilities in place through an engagement with Indigenous methods of relating to the environment. Indigenous peoples live in an expansive kinship system that conceptualizes the cosmos as one large extended family. These kinship terms hold significant meaning within Indigenous narratives and help to construct a world that recognizes a complex system of bonds between forms of life that share a space. The activities will include discussions of worldview within Indigenous languages and culture. Sessions will also include activities to practice relationships to the environment. **Mark Freeland** is Bear Clan from the Bahweting Anishinaabe Community in Northern Michigan (Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians) and Director of the Electa Quinney Institute and Associate Professor of Anthropology at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee. He is a spouse, father, son and uncle to many.



July 23 – 29 **Claudio Carvalhaes** **Exploring Our Senses to Connect with the Land**

We often don't pay attention to the forms of our own perception. For this workshop we use Ring Lake to learn more about our senses. Each day we will focus on a specific sense: see, hear, touch, smell and taste and how we relate to the land. From this experience, we will learn how to create rituals that will help us connect with the land in new ways. **Cláudio Carvalhaes**, earth thinker, theologian, liturgist and artist, is a native Brazilian who holds a Ph.D. in Liturgy and Theology from Union Theological Seminary in New York City. Carvalhaes has preached at events like the Festival of Homiletics, Academy of Homiletics, and the Wild Goose Festival. He led worship for the All African Council of Churches in Mozambique, taught at the Global Institute of Theology of the World Communion of Reformed Churches, and led worship and teaches at the Hispanic Summer Program. His books include *Ritual at World's End: Essays on Eco-Liturgical Liberation Theology* and *Praying With Every Heart – Orienting Our Lives to the Wholeness of the World*.



July 30 – August 5 **Chris DePree** **Everywhere is an Observatory, Everybody is an Astronomer**

For tens of thousands of years, humans all over our planet developed a sophisticated understanding of the nighttime and daytime skies without formal education or expensive observatories. And they used their understanding to help them to know where they were in space and time. In our time together, we will explore the ways in which we can learn to be more attentive to the sky above us and its motions and rhythms, using the dark night skies of Ring Lake Ranch. During the week, you will have opportunities to reflect on your experience through drawing, writing or discussion. **De Pree** holds a PhD in Physics from UNC Chapel Hill. After teaching Physics & Astronomy at Agnes Scott College for 25 years, Chris recently joined the National Radio Astronomy Observatory (NRAO) as the Director of the National Radio Dynamic Zone (NRDZ) Project. Chris loves to share his excitement about astronomy and physics with the widest audience possible, and has written a number of popular science books. He also enjoys reading and writing speculative fiction.

August 6 – 12 **Carrie Newcomer & John McCutcheon** **Dawn, Day, Dusk, Dark:** *A Celebration of Music as Uncommon Prayer*

Join acclaimed songwriters John McCutcheon and Carrie Newcomer for conversation, stories and songs infused with inspiration found in the contemplative works of modern mystics like Merton, Rilke, and Richard Rohr. In a world that can often feel overwhelming, chaotic or broken, we will explore how observing and honoring the patterns and spirit present in nature can help ground us and lift us up in daily and personal ways, guiding us as instruments of peace and action. **Carrie Newcomer** has released fifteen acclaimed albums and facilitates workshops internationally on songwriting, creative writing, activism, and spiritual vocation. She has collaborated and performed with a wide range of artists and writers, including Alison Krauss and Union Station, Nickel Creek, Indian sarod master Amjad Ali Khan, and Parker Palmer. **John McCutcheon** is one of America's most beloved folksingers and a master of a dozen different traditional instruments. His thirty recordings have garnered every imaginable honor including seven Grammy nominations. His commitment to grassroots political organizations has put him on the front lines of many issues important to communities and workers. Session is full, wait list only, please.

August 20 – 26 **Belden Lane** **Ravished by Nature's Beauty:**

The Mystics on Desire
The landscape of the Wind River Range would have driven nature mystics like Rumi, Hafiz, Hildegard of Bingen, and Ignatius Loyola crazy with desire. Catherine of Siena and Teresa of Avila delighted in the symbols of fire and water in describing the love of God. Teilhard de Chardin spoke of the entire world as infused or divinized with the transforming presence of the divine. We'll explore these mystics as they engaged in the Great Conversation with the rest of the natural world, falling head over heels in love. In addition to hiking along waterfalls and ponderosa pines, we'll incorporate images, music, storytelling, and poetry in our sessions together. **Belden Lane**, a storyteller and wilderness backpacker, is Professor Emeritus of Theological Studies at Saint Louis University. His books include *The Solace of Fierce Landscapes*, *Backpacking with the Saints*, and *The Great Conversation: Nature and the Care of the Soul*.

Aug 27 – Sept 2 **Mickey Scott Bey Jones & Rachel Harding** **Remnants of Our Past and Hope for the Future:**

Spiritual Activism for Today
This session will explore the generational wisdom of Black women, lessons in radical accompaniment and hospitality from the Southern Freedom Movement of the 1960s, and the resilience we can learn from our elders in order to meet challenging times ahead. Micky will lead practices from her work as a movement chaplain and resilience coach and Rachel will share personal insights and practices of self and communal care from African American and other African diasporic ritual traditions. **Mickey Scott Bey Jones** is an author, facilitator, movement chaplain, certified Enneagram coach and the Director of Healing and Resilience with the womanist southern-based collective Faith Matters. Named one of the Black Christian leaders changing the world in Huffington Post, Micky is a contributing author of *Becoming Like Creoles: Living and Leading at the Intersections of Injustice, Culture and Religion*. A writer, historian and poet, **Rachel Harding** is Associate Professor of Indigenous Spiritual Traditions at the University of Colorado Denver and specializes in religions of the Afro-Atlantic diaspora. Rachel's book, *Remnants: A Memoir of Spirit, Activism, and Mothering*, combines her own writings with the reflections of her mother, Rosemarie Freaney Harding.

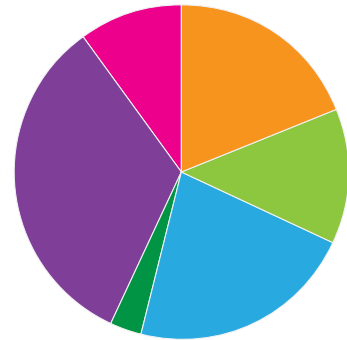

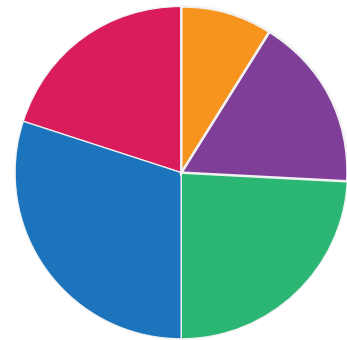

Through nine seminars, five high school groups, and Volunteer Week in 2022, we hosted a total of 439 guests and volunteers for a total of 2,325 guest nights. Of those guests, 230 were children, and 240 were new guests to the ranch. We also hosted the museum petroglyph tours for 128 people, some of whom were school children. We also worked with the Boys and Girls Club to create one-of-a-kind educational experiences for 29 children of all ages.

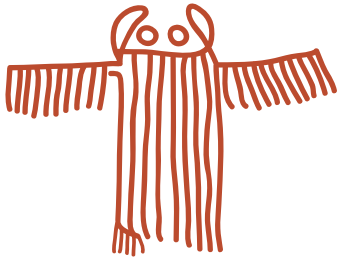
